She was considered the finest of them all by Pier Ferdinando Casini who said; "She was an extraordinary woman, an unsettling witness of the West and its values." Born Jun 29, 1929 in Florence, she became a journalist in her late teens while attending the University of Florence. She worked in Hollywood in the 1950's and 60's. During the late 60's she began her life's work, covering war at a time when few women did. She is survived by her sister Paola and Paolo's three children. .

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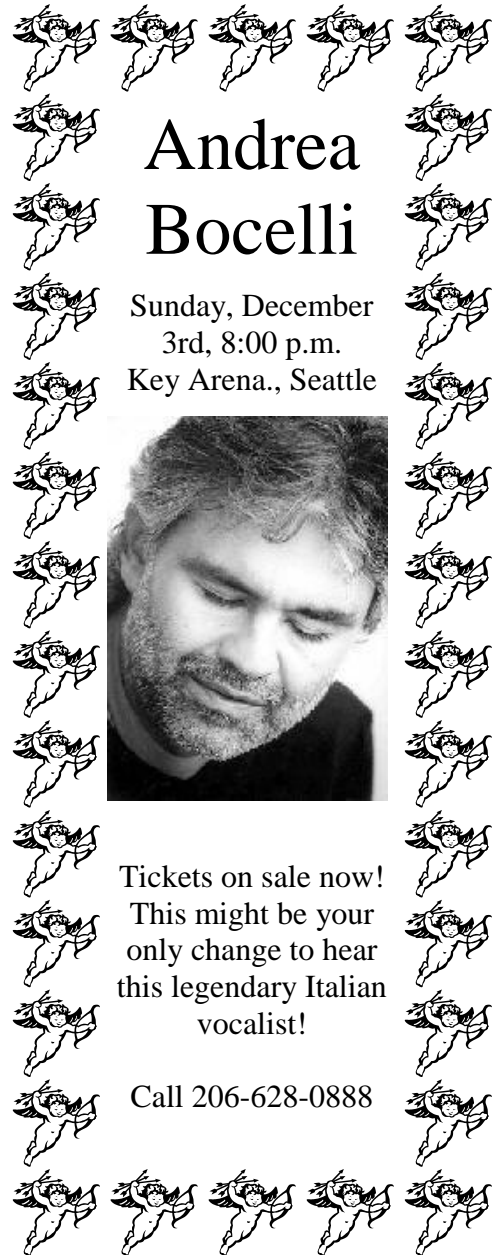

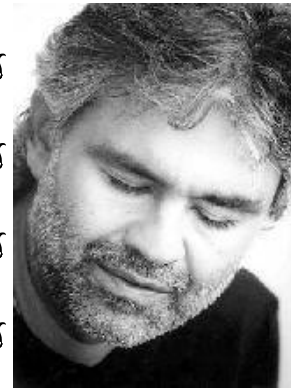

The Dante Alighieri Society: a History

A mighty flame followeth a tiny spark.

Dante Alighieri was the Florentine poet who created “La Divina Commedia” which is considered the greatest masterpiece produced in Europe in the Middle Ages. Among Dante’s greatest admirers was Giosuè Carducci, a Nobel winning poet and Italian intellectual. Carducci led a group of Italian intellectuals who founded the Dante Alighieri Society in Italy in 1889. Its purpose then, as now, was to promote Italian culture and language around the world in Dante’s name. The society stands independent of political ideologies, national or ethnic origins or religious beliefs. The head office located in Rome is considering the adoption a new logo which will incorporate the words, “*Il Mondo in Italiano,*” [“the World in Italian.”]

Dante Alighieri societies exist all over the world: In North America, South America, most countries in Europe, Australia & New Zealand, as well as chapters in Tunisia, Hong Kong and Japan. Many of these chapters have extensive web sites and offer books, scholarships, courses of study, links to history and works of Dante and recipes, and more.

The head office and largest chapter is in Roma where 300 scholarships each year are awarded to foreign students to study Italian art and culture. Scholarships are also being offered by the Columbia University, Cambridge and Michigan Societies, to name a few. The Cambridge, Massachusetts society, founded in the 1920’s actually own their own building.

The Dante Society in Seattle has been around for a long time. According to our informant, Paola Martini Scott, the club had been meeting at least in the 1940’s, but stopped during World War II. Paola joined the society as a grad student in 1974, and was among the people who started the language program by getting money from Italy. We were very small back then and had comfortable meetings in little rooms. What Dante in the 1970’s lacked in numbers, they made up for in enthusiasm. Such a small group was able to start the language school which is still teaching Italian today to hundreds of people every year.
